H.E. Heidi Grau, joined the diplomatic service of the Swiss Federal Department of Foreign Affairs in 1997. She has a Master's Degree in international relations (2004, Tbilisi State University) and in gender studies (2002, Central European University). 
Speakers:



Khatia Dekanoidze is a member of the Georgian Parliament of the 10th convocation, Independent MP. Launching her career following the Rose Revolution of 2003, Dekanoidze first served as an official within the Ministry of Internal Affairs and as a diplomat, before being appointed as head of the Police Academy to oversee law enforcement recruitment reforms. In 2012, she became head of the National Examination Center and Minister of Education and Science. Following UNM's loss in the 2012 parliamentary elections, she joined the opposition, before moving to Ukraine in 2015, where she was appointed as Chief of the National Police under during the presidency of Petro Poroshenko. Returning to Georgia in 2016, she was elected to Parliament in 2020 and joined the legislature in May 2021 after a boycott in the midst of a political crisis. She served as Chairwoman of the UNM Faction in the Parliament, the only opposition faction in the legislature, from May 2021 to February 2023. In a row with her party, she left the United National Movement on March 24, 2023 and now serves as an Independent MP.



Ana Natsvlishvili is a member of the Georgian Parliament of the 10th convocation and the member of the party "Lelo for Georgia". She is also a professor at the Georgian Institute of Public Affairs (GIPA). In 2017, Ana received Annual Global Human Rights Defender Award. At different times, Ana Natsvlishvili worked at the Essex Transititonal Justice Network (ETJN) as an associate researcher; at the international organization "Penal Reform International" (PRI) at the Caucasus office as the coordinator of the regional project; and at the Human Rights Center (HRIDC) as the project coordinator. Between 2014-2017 she served as an elected chairperson of Georgian Young Lawyers' Association (GYLA). Earlier, she was also a member of the National Constitutional Commission of Georgia and acted as President Giorgi Margvelashvili's parliamentary secretary. Ana Natsvlishvili holds a BA degree from Tbilisi State University (Georgia) in Public International law as well as LLM degree from Essex University (UK) in International Human Rights and Humanitarian Law and Master's Degree from Central European University (Hungary).
